


ALLAN UTECH

ELIZABETH WESTERLUND





SHAKESPEARE'S stage as presented by Mrs. Kenward appeals to sophomores Sylvia Willard and Joe Talbot.








MENTALS OF LEARNING. WE LEARN BY DOING,












With Jim Lewis as Master of Ceremonies, the Honor Society entertained the student body and faculty at their annual Christmas party on December 17.






Homecoming and then Carnival time found them working with enthusiasm on their float for the parade. Their reward was first place for the best advertising of the Carnival.


