




Due to the removal of asbestos, the office staff, Mr. Schehl, Kaye Maertens, and Liz Hughes move to the grade school.










Check 'em

When practice began in August, the Varsity squad had twenty players (11 juniors and 9 seniors). After conference games started, six sophomores also dressed with the varsity. The Vikings had another successful season with a 7 win and 3 loss record. The team was 6-1 in'conference play and was Co-Champs with Alexis. This qualified the Vikings for their sixth straight berth in the State Class 1A Play-Offs. Three players made the All Conference team for both offense and defense. Representing the Cambridge offense were Mark Hoge (receiver), Derek Casteel (tackle), and Thad Boberg (defensive back). Two players, Nate Boberg (offense and defense) and Brady Stromquist (defense), made All Conference Honorable Mention.

The Vikings started the season with a bang. The Orion Chargers came to town and the Vikings came away with an impressive 33-0 victory. The Vikings then played a tough, state ranked Seneca team. The Vikings played hard, but were handed a tough loss. When the team went to ROWVA for their first conference game, they out rushed and out played the Ti-



gers, but Cambridge was held on the goal line and the Tigers preserved their victory. Then Cambridge went on a tear. They won six games in a row including shutouts against Westmer (Homecoming) and Alwood. One of the most exciting games of the season was the last conference game against Alexis. The Vikings led 14-7 with the clock running out. Then Alexis scored to make the score 14-13. When Alexis went for the win with a 2-point conversion, the Vikes played tough defense and stopped the try and got the win. The Vikings went into their play-off game against Annawan trying to extend their six game win streak. Annawan had other ideas. Cambridge got beat by the bigger Annawan squad and thus ended a very successful season for the Vikings. This season will long live in the memories of the players as well as their fans.





The CHS Golf team had one of its greatest seasons this year. They had a 10 win and 6 loss dual match record and in tournaments placed 12th at Monmouth, 3rd at Riverdale, 1st at Mt. Morris, 2nd at the Regional, and 6th at the Sectional. When the team finished second at the re-

When the team finished second at the regional tournament they earned the right to advance to the sectionals of the state tournament. This was the third year in a row that the team has reached the sectionals. Two individuals also excelled in state tournament action this season. Darren Mungerson and Rob Knox ad-

vanced from the regionals to the sectionals and Rob qualified for the state finals for the third year in a row. This made him the only Cambridge golfer to play in three state finals where he placed 14th this year. The Golf team broke the records for low Cambridge dual match team score and low team score at Valley View this season. The new record of 147 (3 over par for four golfers) was shot by Rob Knox with 32(-4), Darren Mungerson with 35(-1), Bret Bowman with 37(+1), and Chad Nelson with 43(+7). Rob Knox broke five individual records in 1990 including the low all-time 9 hole score with a 31(-5), low all-time season average and low senior average with 37.6.





The Viking Wrestling program was disabled by low numbers again this season. The team consisted of three seniors, one junior, three sophomores and six freshmen. Although they were out numbered, the upperclassmen provided good leadership. As a team, they placed seventh in the Viking Classic and twelfth in the Erie Holiday Tournament. Individually, Brady Strompuist placed 1st in the Viking Classic, 2nd at Erie, and 2nd in the Regional Tournament qualifying him for Sectional. Brent Hasson placed 4th in the Regional qualifying him as an alternate to Sectional. Pat Moody placed 4th in the Viking Classic, 5th in the Galva fresh-soph tournament, and 1st in the Viking fresh-soph tournament. 



The team was led in scoring and rebounding by Brian Cardona. Jarrod Grant led the team in free throw percentage.



















rainy weather.










NHS














