




Melting sulfur in a test tube, Mark Lunde and Richard Nelson prepare an experiment for chemistry class.



LANGUAGE

In our language department one will find Spanish and English. When the average youth completes the English program of four years, he should be able to read and write clearly and effectively. Literature and grammar are alternated through the year. The ultimate aim of our English course is to equip the student with the proper tools for improving his writing and speaking. Training in speech assists students to analyze speech deficiencies and gives them opportunity to learn how to correct themselves through proper remedial exercises and constant practice. Spanish has been introduced into Cambridge Schools in order to fulfill an urgent need for modern foreign language study.



MRS. INEZ KENWARD, a graduate of the University of Illinois with a Bachelor of Science degree, teaches English I and II and speech class.




Connie Pavel asks Mrs. Jonson about the grammatical correctness of a sentence in her theme.





SOCIAL STUDIES





MATHEMATICS

Mathematics includes algebra, geometry, advanced math, and trigonometry. Started this year was the new four-year math program consisting of Algebra I, plane geometry, Algebra II, and a combined course of solid geometry and trigonometry. It is felt that this program will better qualify the students for the fields of engineering and math.

VOCATIONAL ARTS


Vocational subjects include home economics, agriculture, and industrial arts. Home economics is designed for all future homemakers. It offers solutions to everyday problems that arise in school and affords answers to future marriage and family living problems. Agriculture is a course primarily for farm boys who hope someday to own their own farms. Each student must have a minimum of one production project with a high percentage of personal ownership. It is expected that over the four years the student will broaden his farming program to such an extent that he will be able to make a satisfactory start in farming or have accumulated enough resources to enter into one of the many fields related to agriculture. Industrial arts includes mechanical drawing, metal work, electricity, and woodworking. This course offers many students a good start in one of the many fields it covers.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

The objectives of physical education are to develop ability to work and play with others and to practice the principles of fair play, co-operation, honesty, and consideration for others. The girls learn co-ordination and muscular skills through their activities, which include archery, hockey, tumbling, volleyball, basketball, dancing, and softball. The boys become apt in activities such as calisthenics, kickball, basketball, cage ball, track, and volleyball. A Physical Education Show is given annually in which the junior and senior high combine their talents to entertain the audience. During the winter, health is taught once a week.





The school cooks, Mrs. Tucker, Mrs. Neuman, Mrs. Kellogg and Mrs. Boberg, wait for the first noon hour students.





ORGANIZATIONS

CHORUSES

At C.H.S. there are three different choruses for students to join--girls', boys', and mixed. The chief aim of any chorus work is to train students to read music, to acquaint them with different phases of music, and to teach them to harmonize. The boys' chorus, directed by Mr. Charles Burrus, is open to any boy with the desire to express himself in song. In doing so, these students give pleasure to others as well as to themselves. Girls' chorus is made up of freshman, sophomore, junior, and senior girls who wind their way into many lands and moods, via music. Mixed chorus is generally open to all members of either boys' or girls' chorus. Since the number of members is somewhat limited, the chorus is usually composed of the better vocalists. Because of their diligent practice, the students in mixed chorus harmonize well, and are really a treat to hear. Most of the practice time of the three groups is devoted to numbers for Christmas and spring concerts, the Cornbelt Festival, or contests.






STUDENT COUNCIL


TOWARD A BETTER YEARBOOK








Surrounded by members of the Atkinson squad, Cambridge players fight for control of the ball.


VARSITY SQUAD EXHIBITS DESIRE

The varsity basketball squad started off the season with three first string lettermen, a new coach, and hopes of improving their last year's record. Although we lost our first game, our contest with Geneseo on our home court greatly enlightened our hopes for a successful season. This game was probably one of the team's best played games all year as the Geneseo team was expected to defeat us by 15 to 20 points. Shockingly, the tables turned and we gained a victory, 51 to 50, overcoming a twenty point deficit in the last quarter. In conference play, the team got off to a slow start by receiving narrow defeats in a number of games. Our best conference game was undoubtedly our home game with Sherrard Tigers, who we beat-their second and last conference defeat. 

TRACK TEAM COMBINES WINNING

A short time after basketball season, the Cambridge track squad of 41 members could be seen running laps around the school block under the direction of Mr. Rumley and Mr. Truckenbrod. The squad participated in sixteen track and field meets starting with a triangular meet in March. The fresh-soph squad placed sixth in the Fresh-Soph Conference Track Meet, while the varsity, with 18 points, placed fifth in the Varsity Conference Track Meet. Six records were broken in the varsity conference meet, three of them being records formerly held by Cambridge track stars. The school high jump record was broken by Don Carlson who jumped 5 ft. 9 1/2 in. in the District track meet held at Rock Island. 












