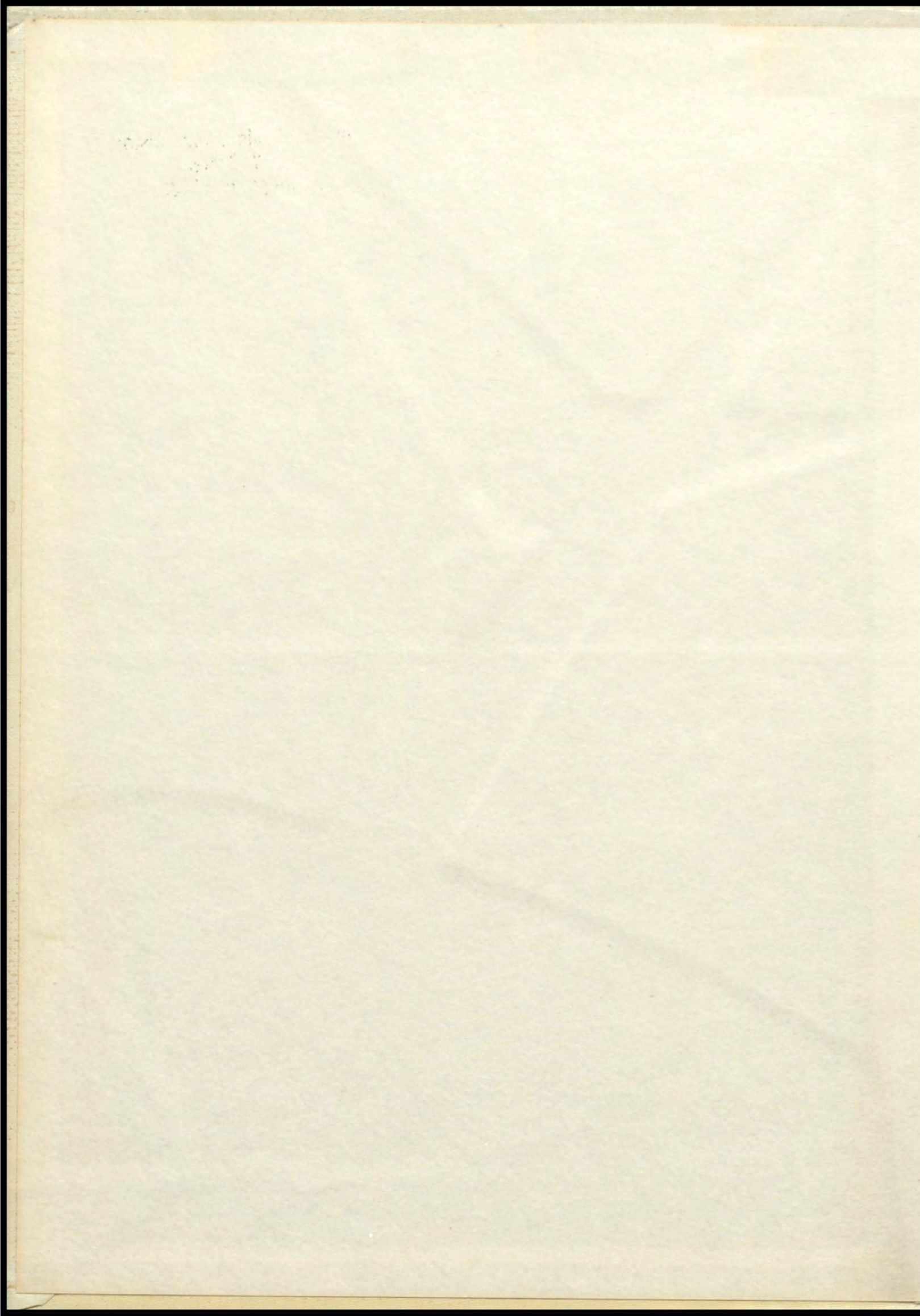

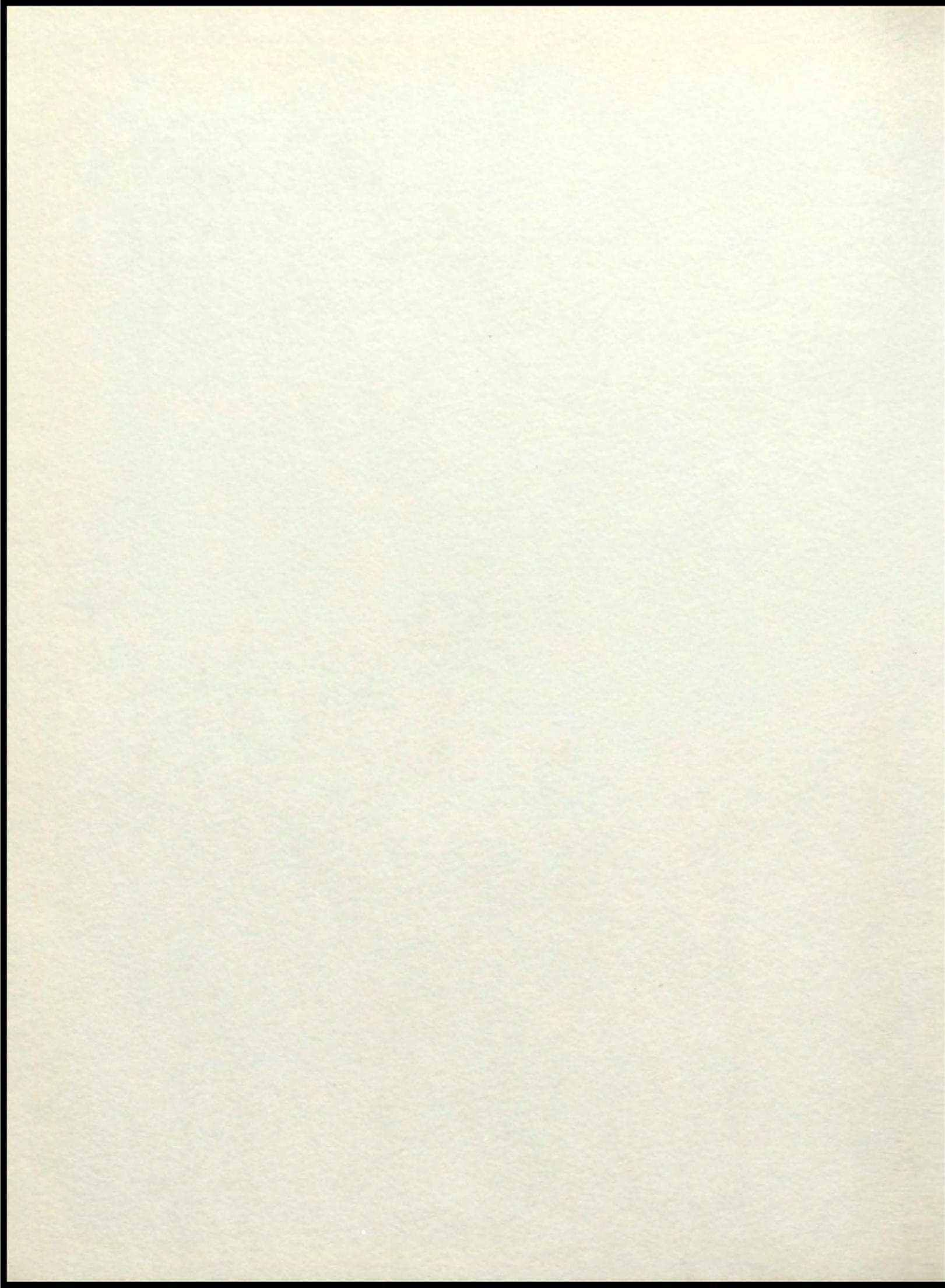

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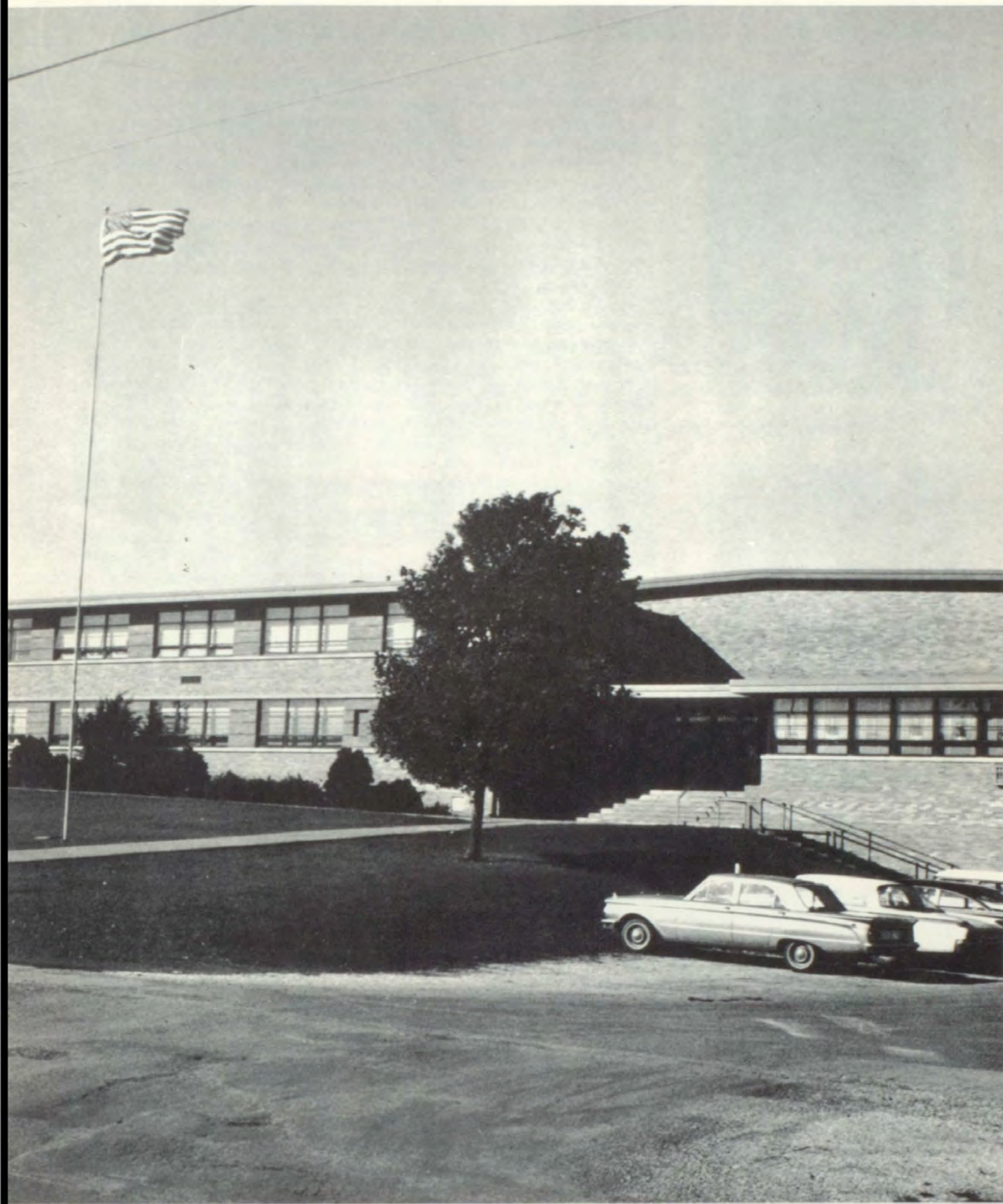

The past 25 years at CHS have seen many changes and improvements since the first Viking annual was published. In the next few paragraphs, a brief summary of the past 25 years will be undertaken with the use of information from the preceeding 24 annuals.

In the school year of 1938-39, when Harley N. Rohm was principal, the Viking Staff was organized and the first Viking Yearbook was edited with Miss Elizabeth Westerlund as advisor.

The years 1937, 1938, and 1939 proved to be very successful for our baseball team and Coach Raymond Johnson. We won all the games each of those years and were proud to call ourselves the Conference Champions.

A new sport was introduced into Cambridge High School in 1940. Six-man football took the place of baseball. The game, which was then sweeping the country, was adopted by neighboring schools to form a conference which included Orion, Alexis, Sherrard, and Cambridge. Many boys turned out for the team game, which was as new to Coach Johnson as it was to them. We won two games out of six. With the help of Coach Johnson, however, we steadily improved, and, in 1946, we claimed the championship title. Although Cambridge had previously taken part in track events, the first annual Cornbelt Conference Meet was held in 1941 at the fair grounds. Cambridge scored two first and placed in almost every event.

There were many sorrowful faces around CHS when Mr. Rohm handed in his resignation in 1946, but everyone was eager to welcome Mr. Mosher as the new principal. Also in this year, Warren Page became the football and basketball coach, a job which previously had been filled successfully by Mr. Johnson. A new organization, the FFA, was formed in 1945-46 with Dale Sherrard as the advisor. The highlight of this club's activities was the crowning of the first FFA Queen.

In 1949, a new high school was in the process of construction, its location being in the southwest edge of town. The new high school was opened in 1950, and the grade school took over the old building. This was an exciting year at CHS, not only because all sports were now held at the new Viking Stadium, but also because three new organizations were added. These were the GAA, FHA, and the TAB Book Club, from

which students could order paperback books for reasonable prices.

The year 1951 proved to be very successful for our football team as we came through the season with eight wins and no losses, thus gaining the first undisputed championship in the Viking history. One outstanding project in the year of 1952 was undertaken by the Student Council. This was the erection and dedication of our flag pole, which now stands in front of the building.

Mr. Mosher left Cambridge High in 1954, and was replaced by Warren T. Page, the former coach. Mr. Albert G. Smith was then secured as coach with Jim Doyle for an assistant. The most successful basketball season CHS had ever had was in 1955 when we won 22 games and lost only 4. In 1956, the FTA was organized by students who were interested in the teaching profession.

We attained a new coach, Mr. Atkinson, in 1957, and Mr. Smith, the previous coach, stepped into the office of principal. A new addition to the school was begun in 1958. This included our present cafeteria, bandroom, and Junior High departments. In 1959, classes were held in the new addition, Latin was adopted, and the Science Club was started again with Mr. Place as advisor. For these reasons, this year was said to be the year of the "New Look."

In 1960, Miss Westerlund, yearbook advisor for 22 years, retired from that position, and Mr. Philip Shutt took over as advisor. Spanish was taught in place of Latin in 1961, and the Spanish Club was added to the list of organizations.

In the year 1962, we gained many new teachers including two new coaches, Coach Truckenbrod for football and Coach Birkett for basketball. Also this year, Mr. Wigant took over as yearbook advisor. The football season wasn't very successful that year, and in basketball we won 8 games and lost 12. However, we made up for everything in basketball when this year, 1963, we came through the basketball season as Cornbelt Conference Champs. Everyone was exceedingly happy over this, for it was the first time in eight years that we had done it. Also this year, the Future Nurses Club was organized with Mrs. Dahlberg, school nurse this year, as sponsor of it.

Thursday, August 30, 1962, marked the end of a long, lazy summer and the beginning of another school term for the 220 students at CHS. Freshman Initiation rolled around again with the freshmen slaving for the seniors. Since "turn-about is fair play," the seniors sponsored the all high school party to welcome the frosh to CHS.

Football season started in mid-September. The boys played their hardest, and towards the end of the season, their work paid off in victories. Homecoming was a gala event. Whipping Alwood 20-13 was a wonderful way to end the season.

Bake sales, chili suppers, and work days foretold the coming Carnival. This year the sophomores reigned victorious. Thanksgiving vacation came, bringing with it the start of the basketball season. This was, with only two exceptions, a great year for Cambridge in the Cornbelt Conference play. The Vikings did not stop until they had beaten Orion, secured the gold basketball, and made themselves the undisputed Cornbelt Conference Champs!

December and winter came to CHS. Dr. David gave an assembly on physics. The choruses and band gave their annual Christmas Concert, and the Honor Society sponsored the Christmas Dance. Vacation began!

Resolutions were being made fast and furious when school resumed with the new year. Some of these resolutions came in

handy when in mid-January, the third six weeks ended, and semester tests were given. Lynn Bloxom gave an assembly on Ralph Whitcomb Reilly, a famous writer.

February 1, 1963, was the date of the historic faculty-Varsity Club basketball game. Together with the proceeds from this game and months of saving, the Varsity Club was able to purchase their whirlpool. The Sweetheart Ball, co-sponsored by the FFA and FHA was held in mid-February. Also in February, a table tennis exhibition performed by two professionals from Europe was greatly enjoyed by the student body at an assembly.

March not only blew in kite-flying weather, but also National Merit Tests for the juniors, University of Illinois Exams for seniors, and the State Music Contest at Peoria. After weeks of rehearsals, the junior class presented their play, "Stag Line" in April. After Easter and a restful spring vacation, work began in earnest on the Freshman-Sophomore Hop which was held on the 26th.

With May came the feverish activity of juniors hard at work on the Junior-Senior Prom held May 17, 1963. The Spring Music Concert was held early in May. Every day of May seemed to be full to the brim with things to be done. Senior class night, the honor assembly, Baccalaureate, and finally Commencement brought to a close another memorable year at Cambridge High School.

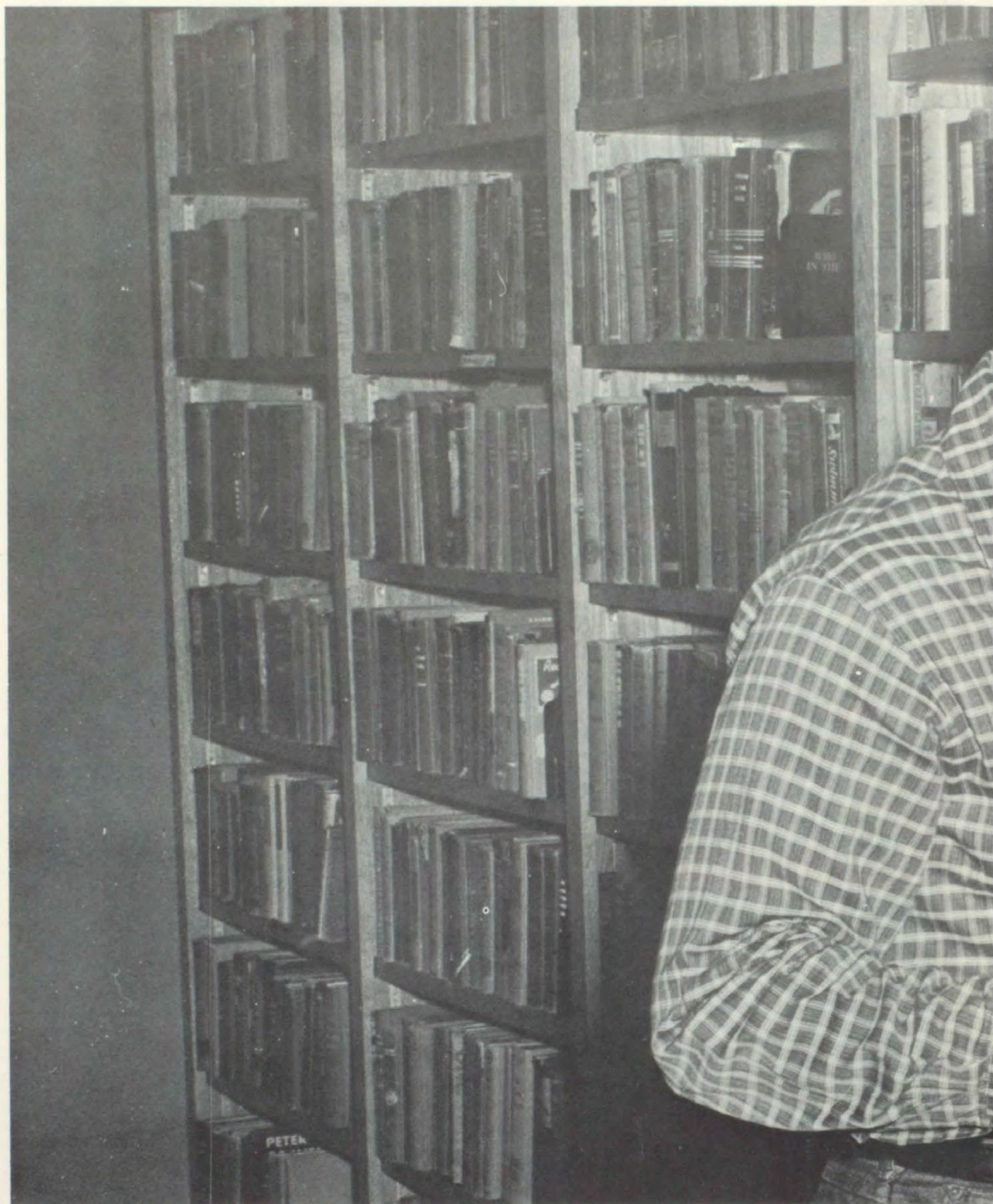


Demonstrating the effects of a gyroscope as large as a bicycle wheel is Dr. David at one of our school assemblies.



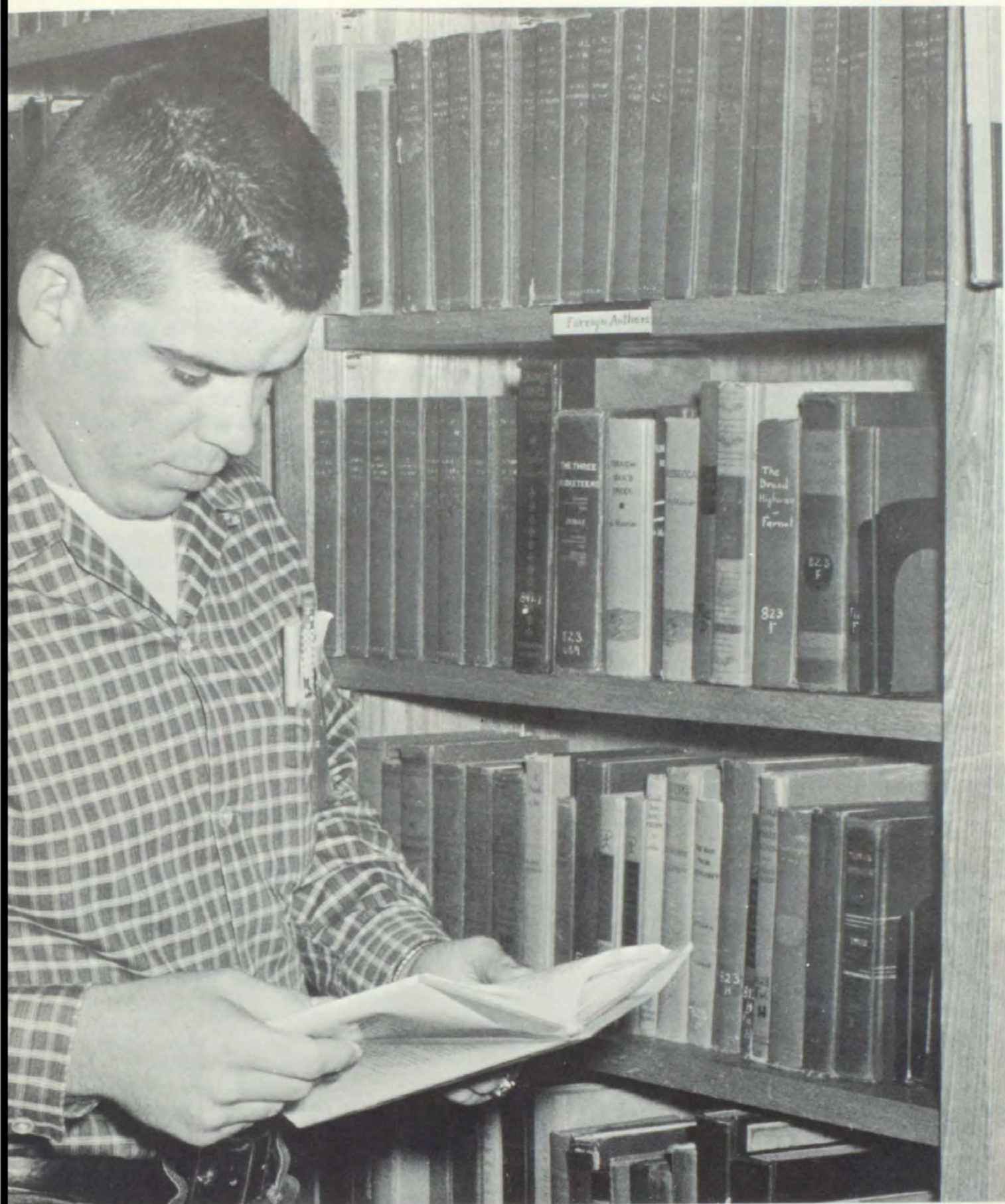

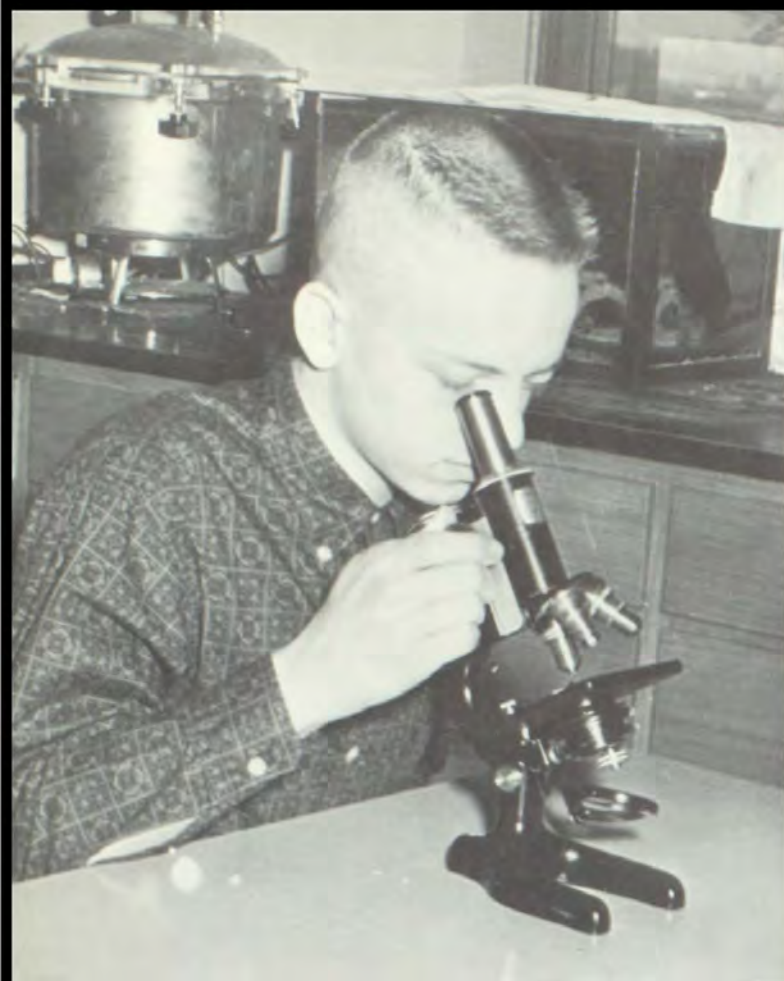
"Now where is that student identification slip?" says Mrs. Burgeson, school secretary, as she checks through the many files in the office.

SCIENCE and MATHEMATICS

Our science department includes general science, biology, and during alternate years, chemistry and physics.

This important department has several goals: to enable students to get a thorough background in all phases of science, to understand themselves in relationship to their environment, to gain the necessary knowledge in preparation for higher learning, and to give students a better understanding and appreciation of the sciences.

Mathematics includes algebra, geometry, advanced math, and trigonometry. Started this year was the new four-year math program consisting of Algebra I, plane geometry, Algebra II, and a combined course of solid geometry and trigonometry. It is felt that this program will better qualify the students for the fields of engineering and math.

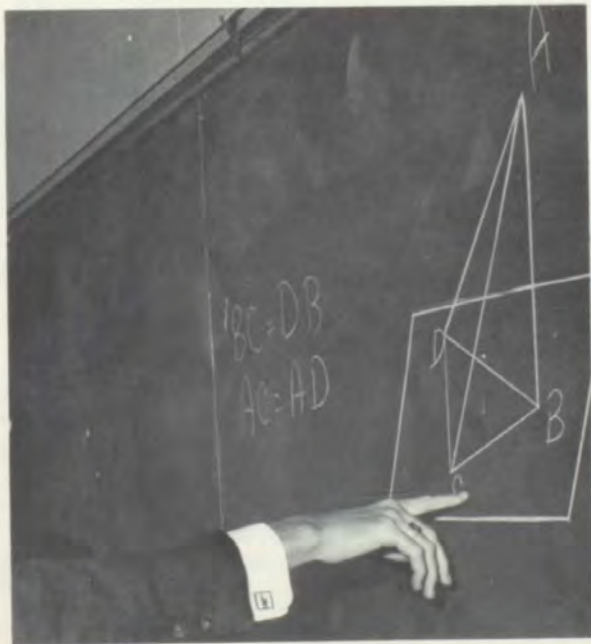
Formula Followers Pursue Minute Detail

LANGUAGE

In our language department one will find Spanish and English. When the average youth completes the English program of four years, he should be able to read and write clearly and effectively. Literature and grammar are alternated through the year. The ultimate aim of our English course is to equip the student with the proper tools for improving his writing and speaking.

Training in speech assists students to analyze speech deficiencies and gives them opportunity to learn how to correct themselves. Spanish has been introduced into Cambridge Schools in order to fulfill an urgent need for modern foreign language study.

LANGUAGE FACULTY

Miss Elizabeth Westerlund, who has taught English I, II, III, and IV for thirty years, attended Augustana College, the University of Wisconsin, and Northwestern, and received a Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of Illinois. One of her happiest experiences was a summer spent in Europe.

SOCIAL STUDIES

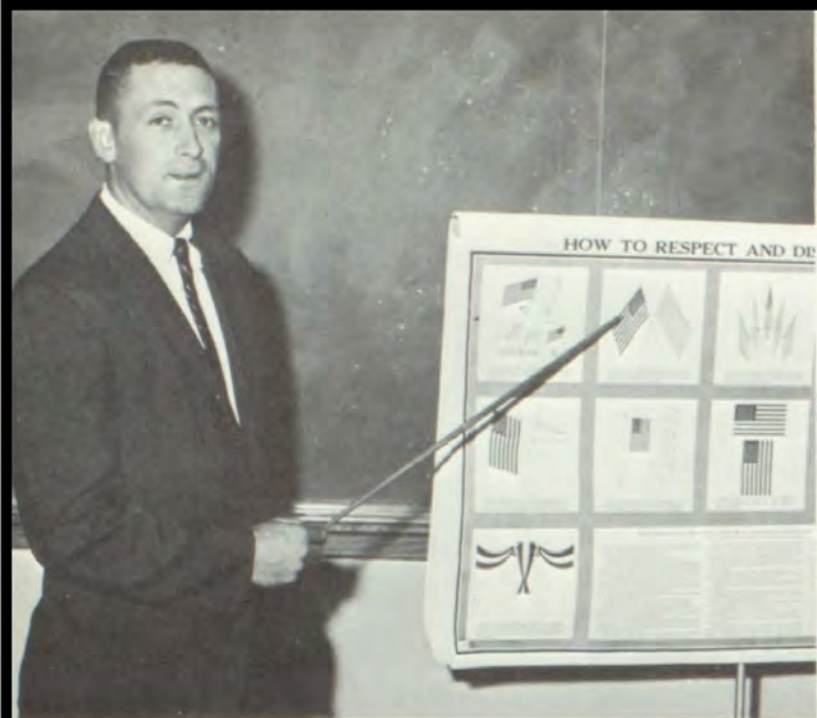

A United States Constitution test must be taken and passed by every student of U.S. History. Modern problems class attempts to keep students up to date on various current problems of the country. Civics is mainly concerned with the workings of our national, state, and local governments.

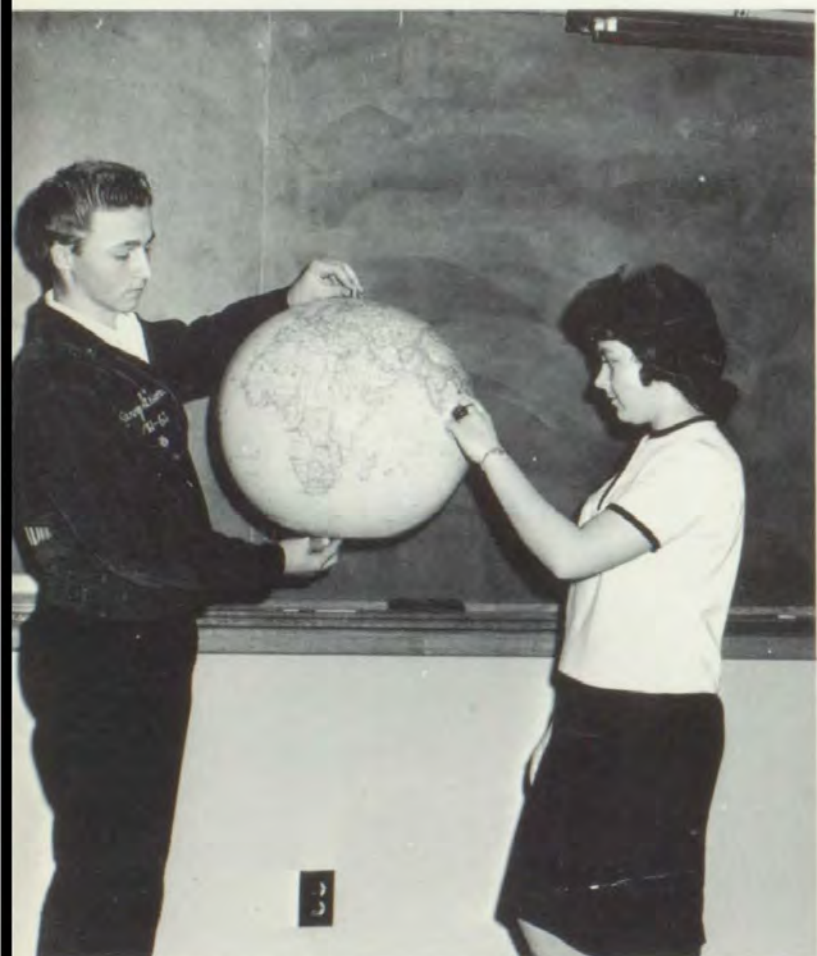
Mr. Truckenbrod has taught physical education, civics, and modern problems at Cambridge for two years. He attended Carthage College where he received his Bachelor of Science degree.

VOCATIONAL ARTS

Vocational subjects include home economics, agriculture, and industrial arts. Home economics is designed for all future homemakers. It offers solutions to everyday problems that arise in school and affords answers to future marriage and family living problems.

Agriculture is a course primarily for farm boys who hope someday to own their own farms. It is expected that over the four years the student will broaden his farming program to such an extent that he will be able to make a satisfactory start in farming or have accumulated enough resources to enter into one of the many fields related to agriculture.

Industrial arts includes mechanical drawing, metal work, electricity, and woodworking. This course offers many students a good start in one of the many fields it covers.

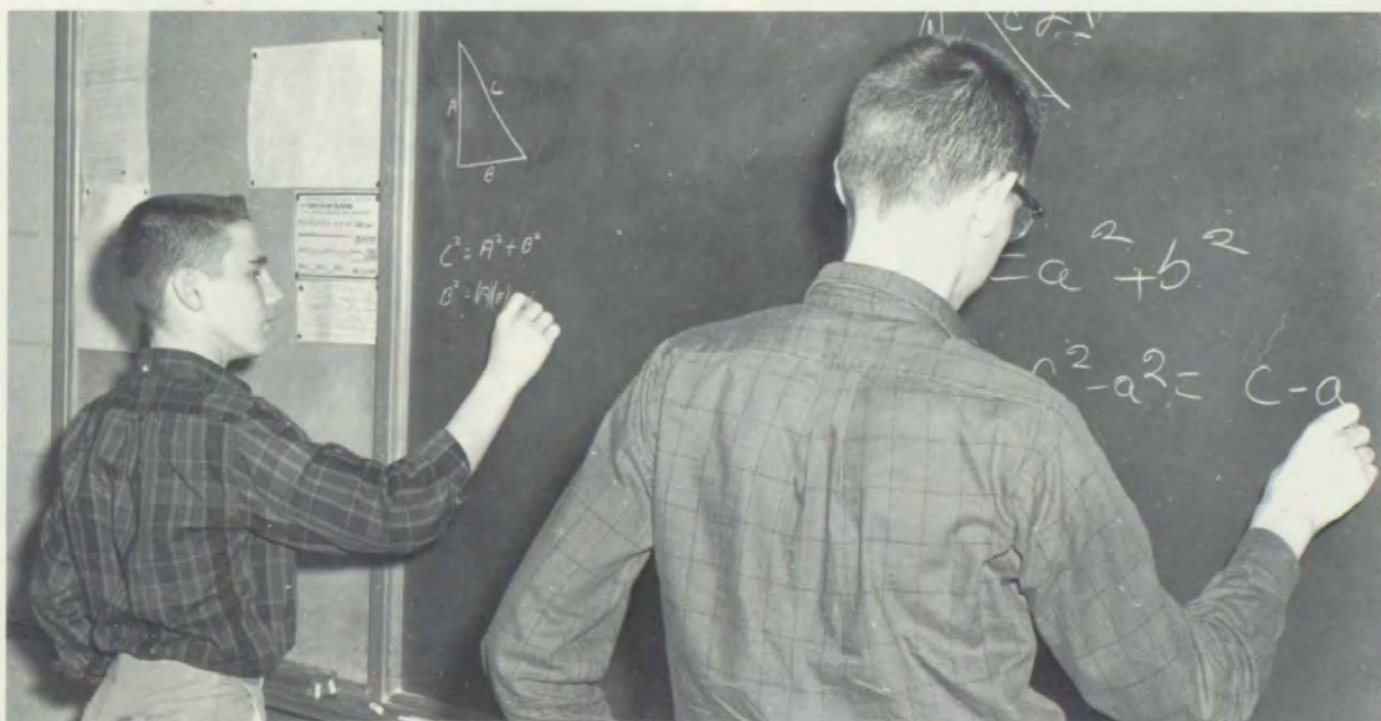

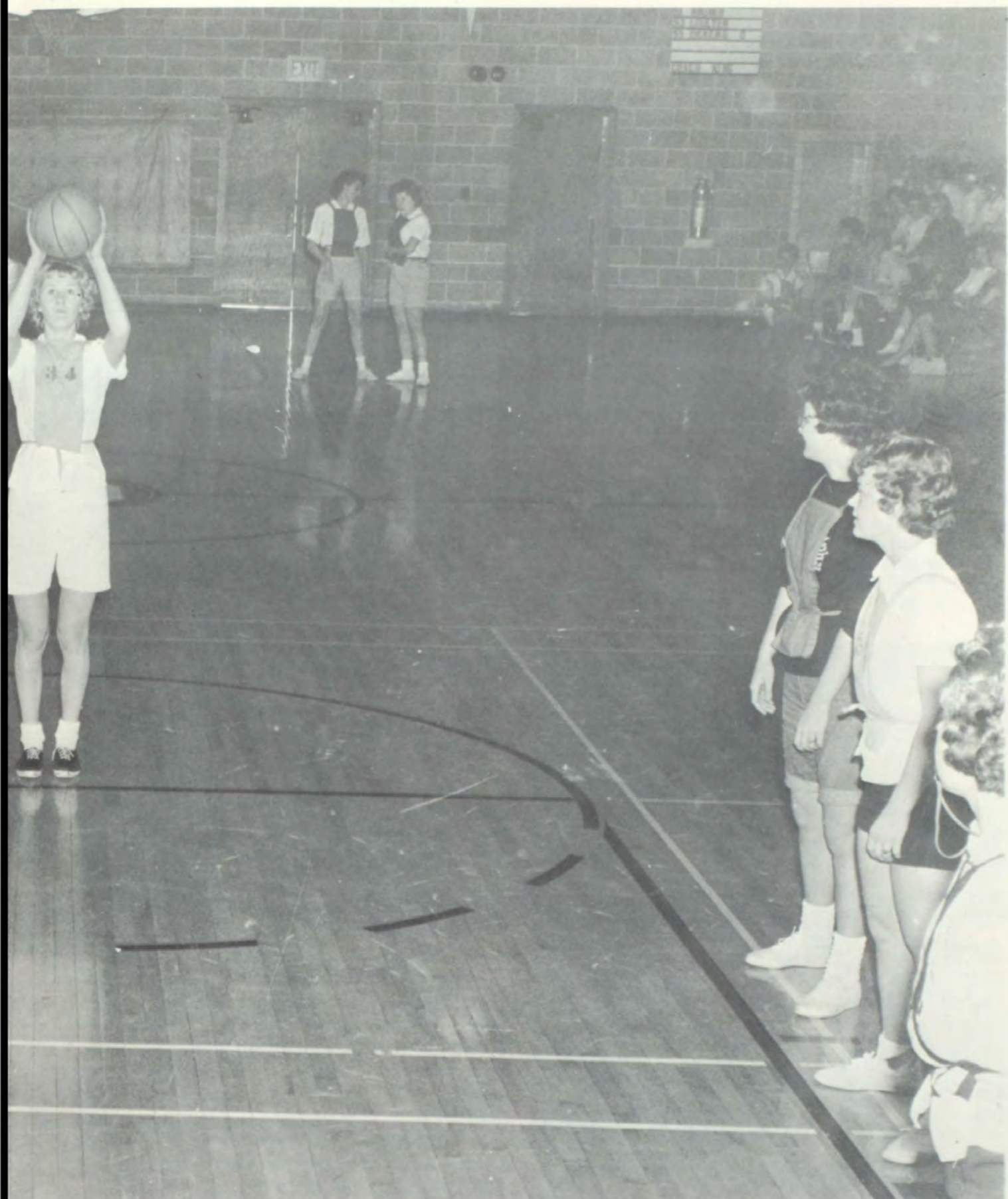

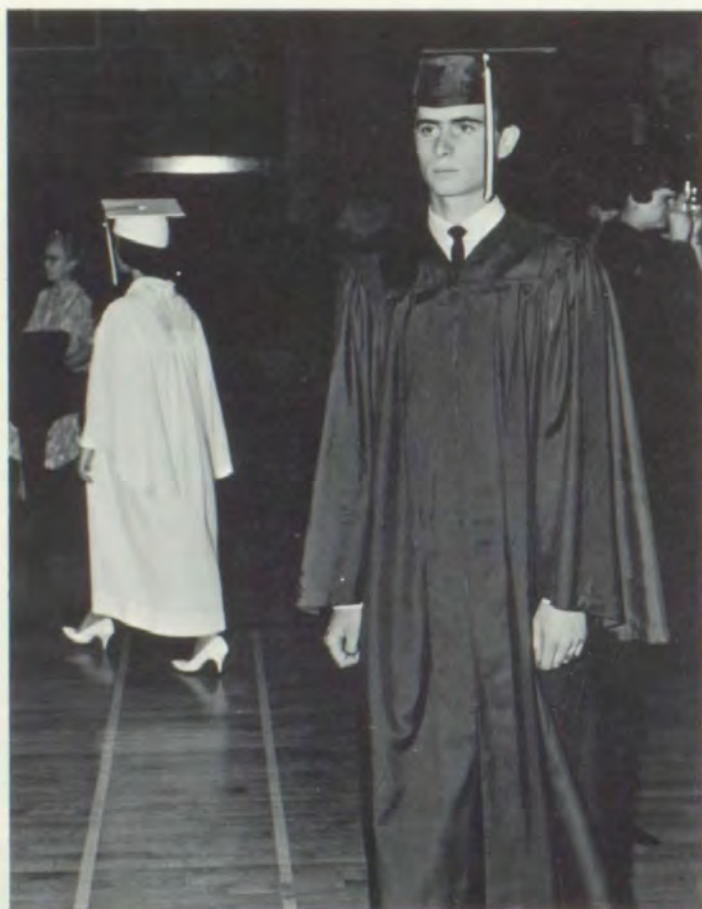
