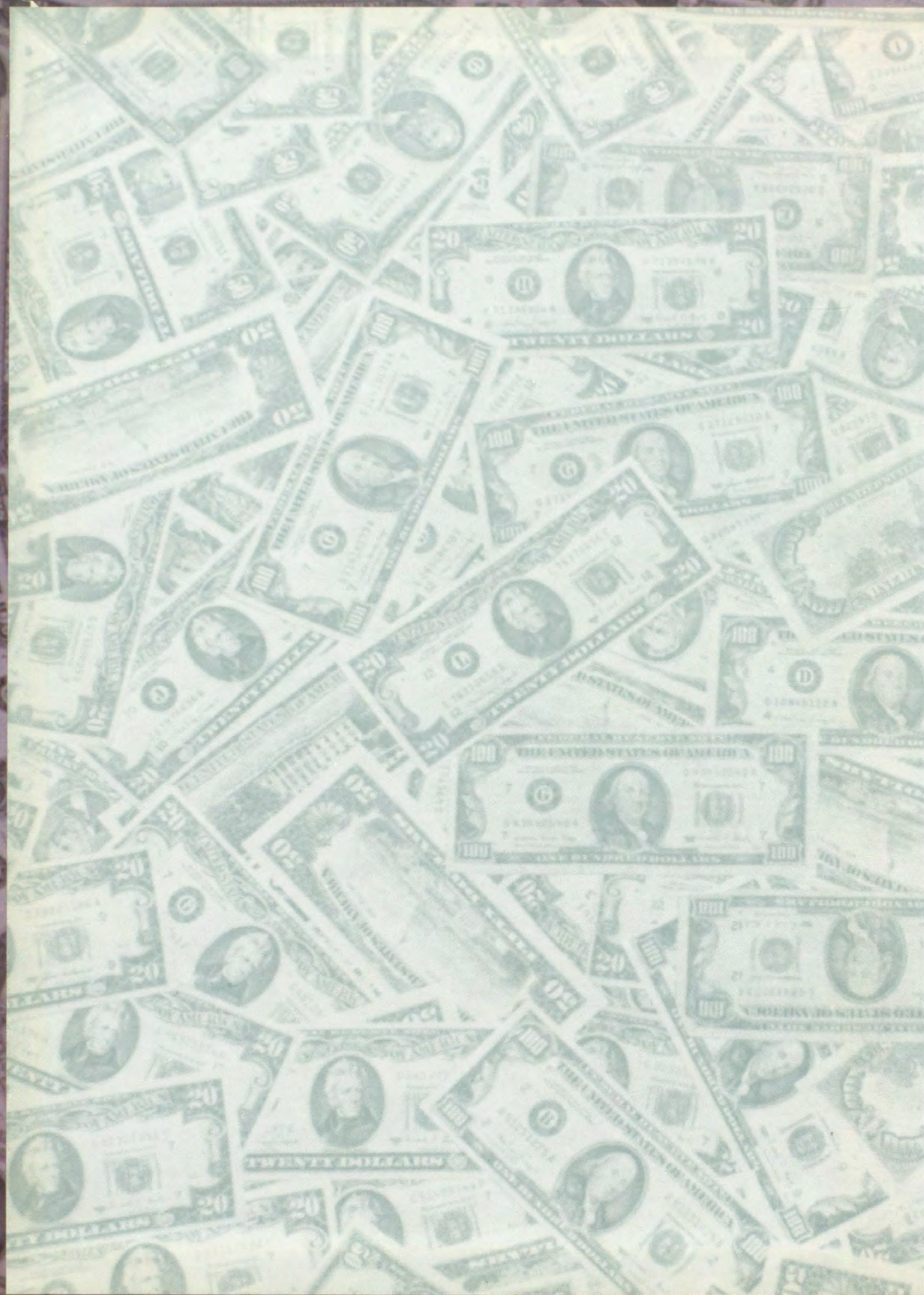

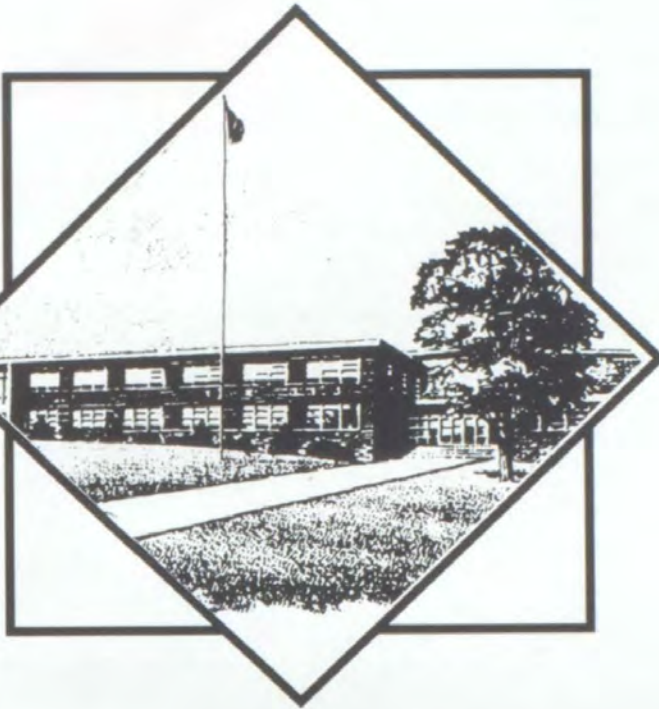

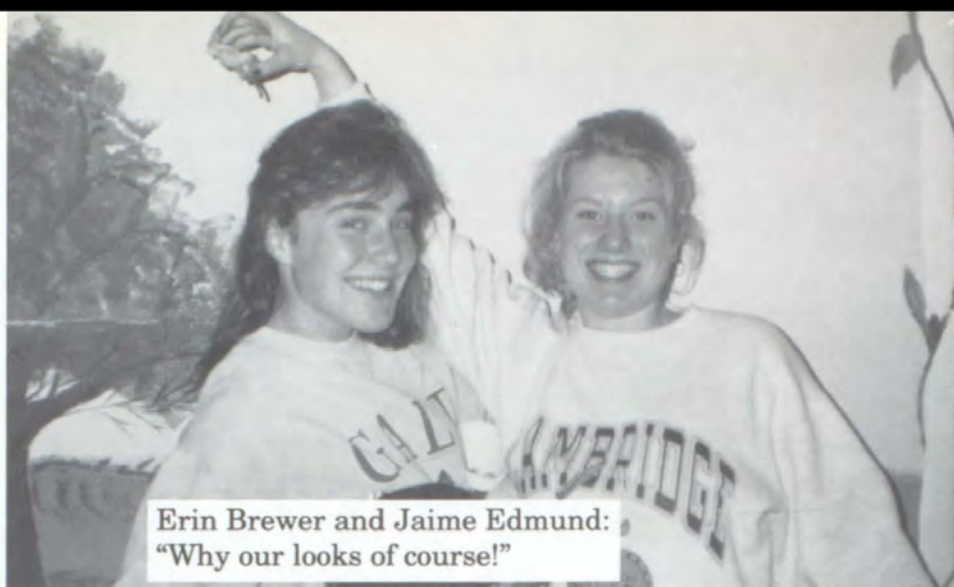

PEER RESISTANCE TEAM FORMED.

Something new was started this year under the supervision of Mrs. Miller, Miss Vandemore, and Mr. Herges. The Peer Resistance Skills Program is a lesson in peer pressure and techniques for saying "NO" that are taught by high school students to younger fifth and sixth graders. The lesson was fifty minutes in length. The first portion of the lesson taught about types of peer pressure and the second half the techniques for saying "NO." Information was presented through the use of four posters and two handouts. The concepts and skills that were taught were reinforced through skits and role

plays. The Peer Resistance Skills Program had its first meeting in October. This group consisted of sixteen high school students dedicated to helping younger students feel more confident about who they are and the choices they make.

The training of these high school students involved a one day camp experience during which the students learned peer resistance skills concepts and the lessons they would teach younger students. An integral part of the training was the fun and recreation of being in the camp setting.

The goals of the program as viewed by the high school students

are:

1. To reduce the likelihood of our younger peers using alcohol and driving a car.
2. To educate our younger peers about types of peer pressure they will or have already encountered.
3. To teach our younger students skills and techniques to be able to say "NO" to alcohol or to say "NO" when the driver has been drinking.
4. To present ourselves as positive role models to our younger peers as high schoolers who care about them and their futures.
5. To have fun while teaching them.

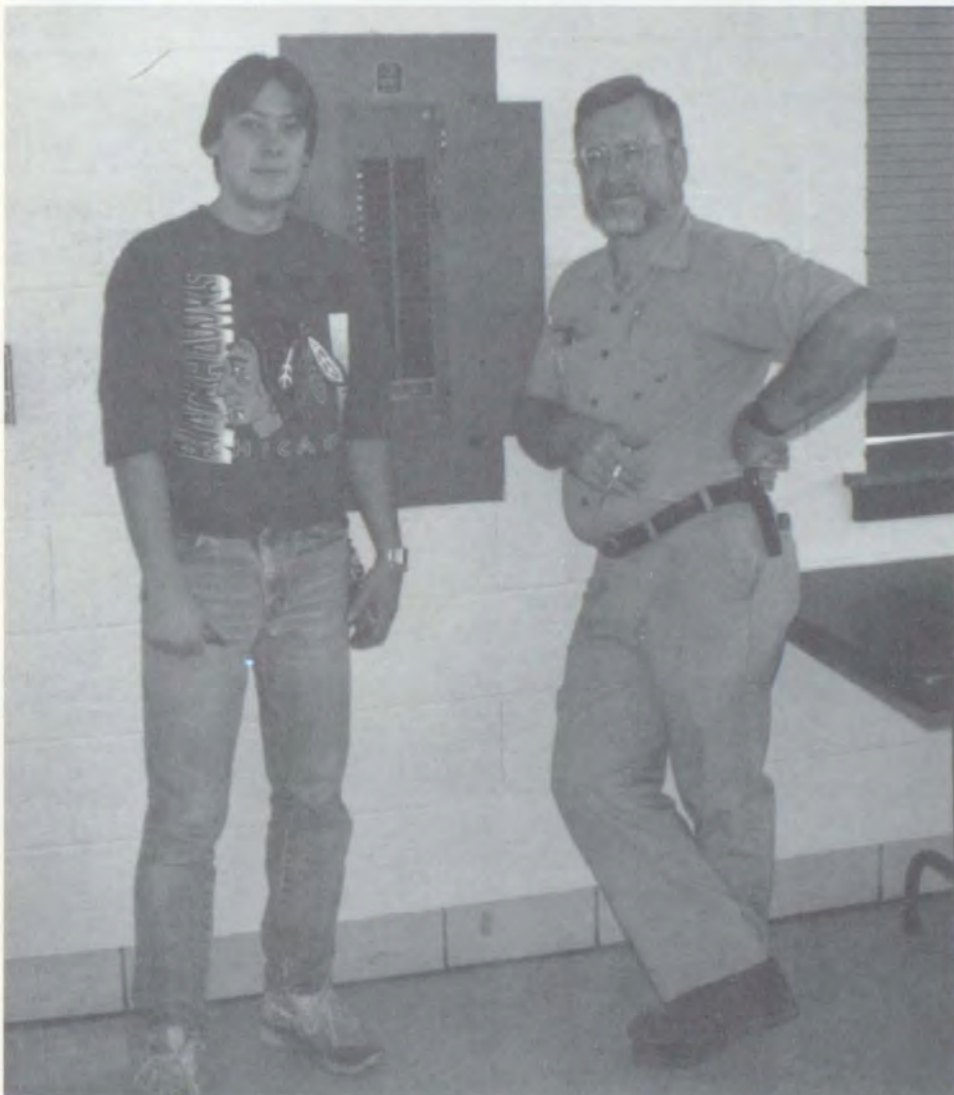

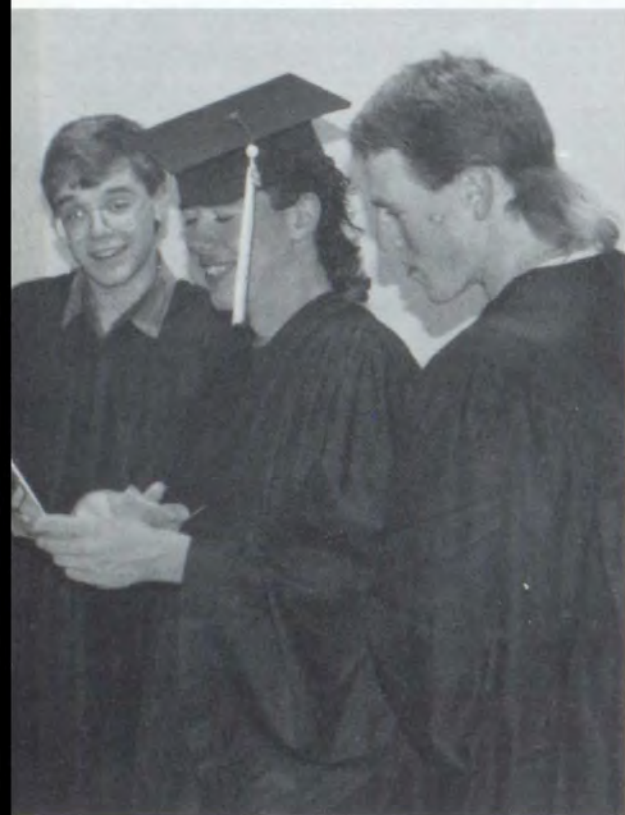

continues. This is accomplished in many ways. Sometimes by listening to lectures, and other times by experimenting individually, or in groups.

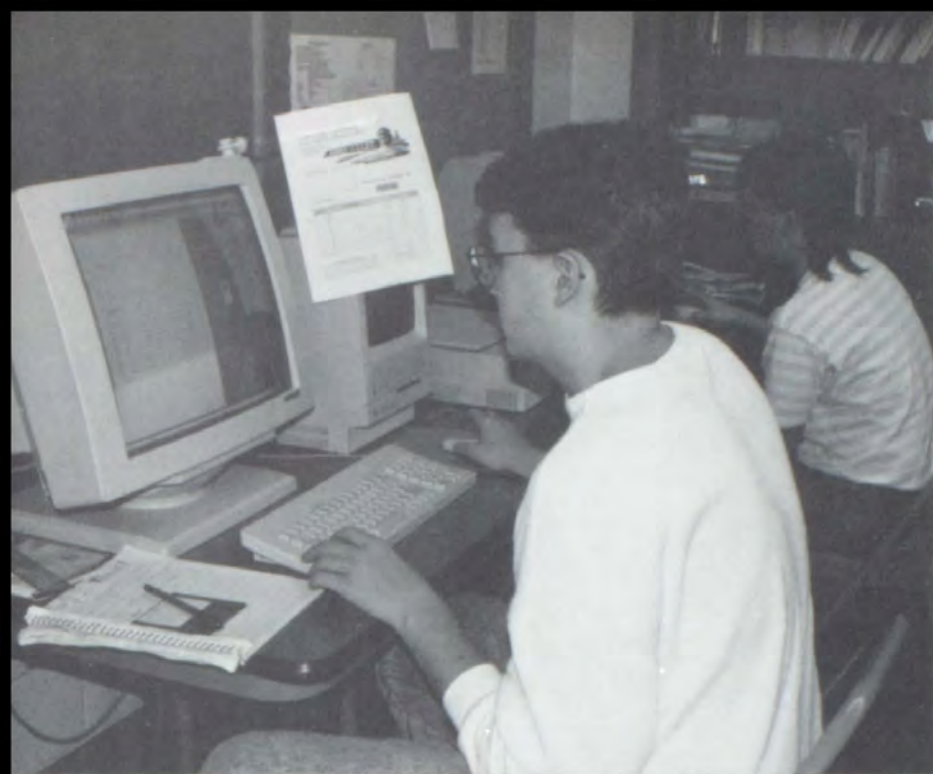

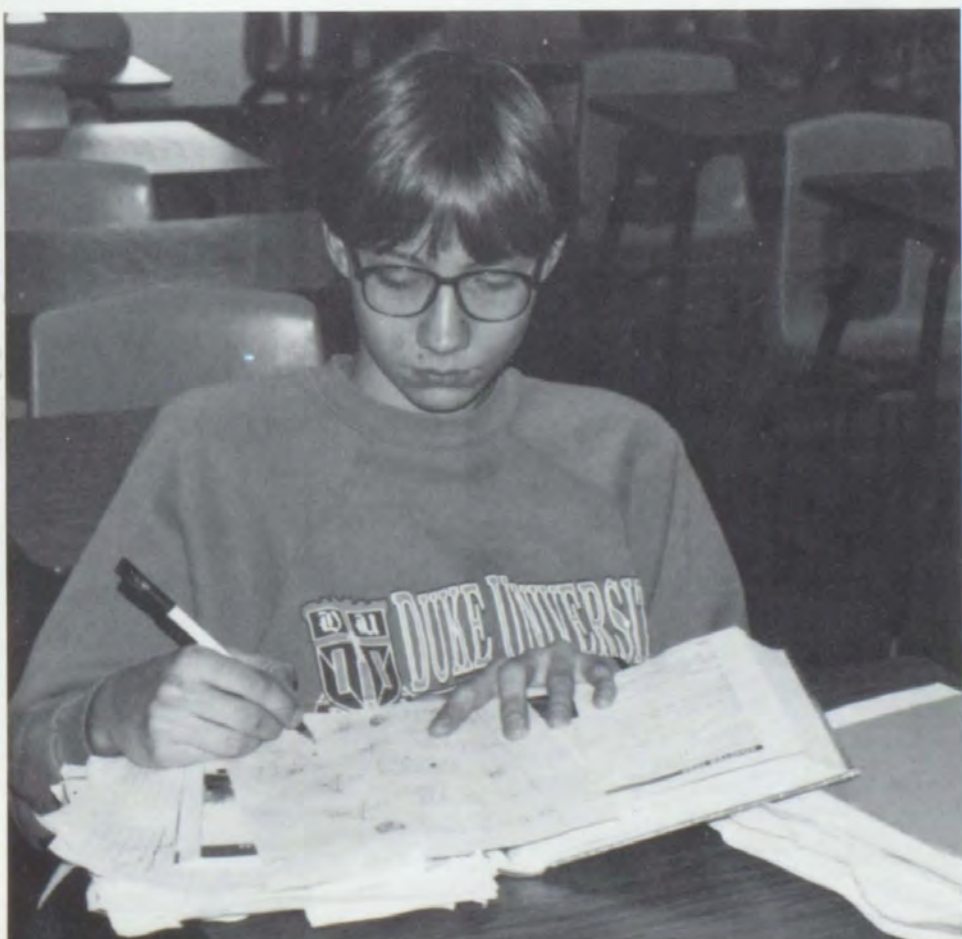

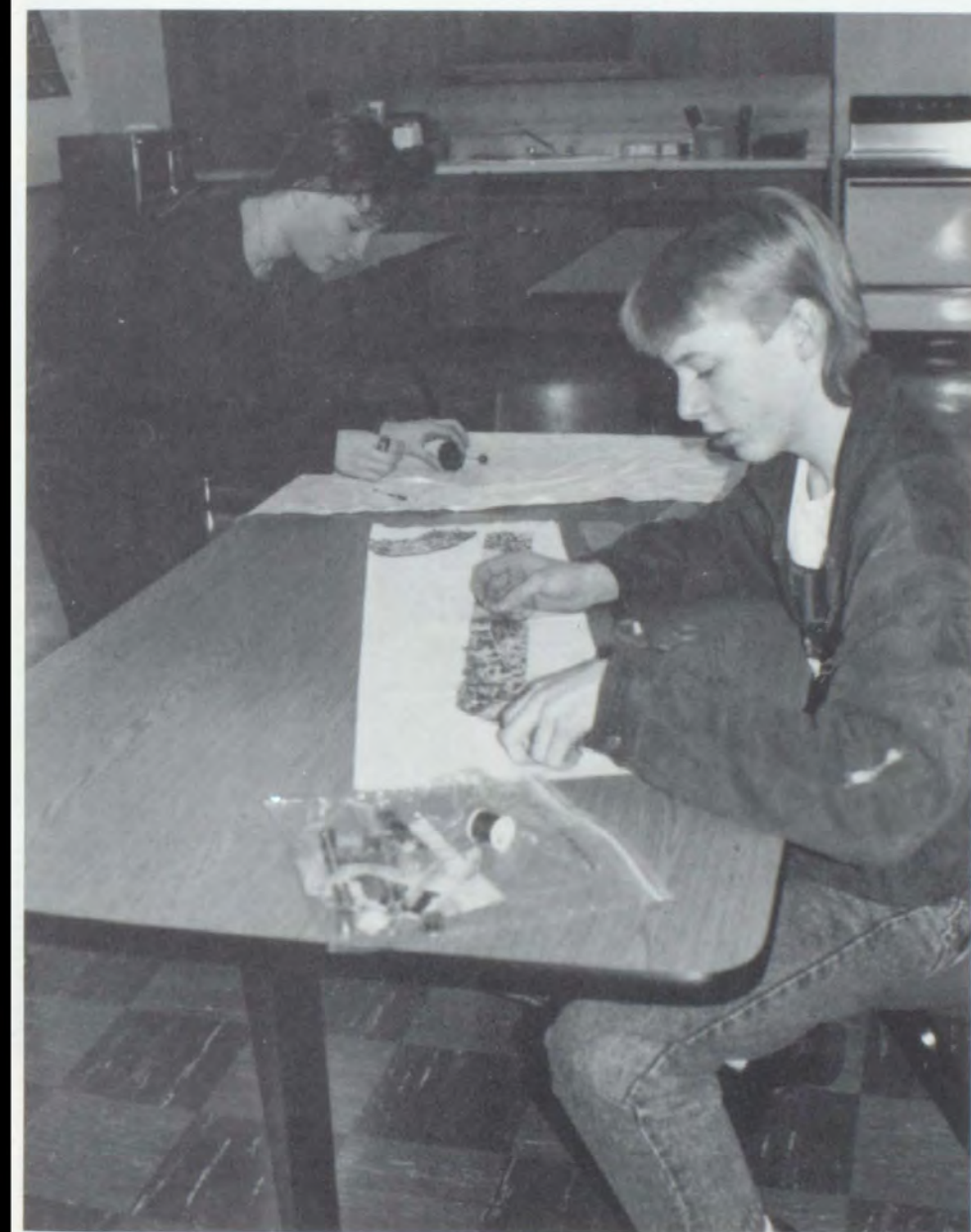

This season was definitely one of streaks for the varsity team which consisted of eight juniors and three seniors. They finished with an overall record of 11-14 and a conference record of 7-7. One problem the team had was its winning and losing streaks. The team would win two or three games and then lose two or three. It could never sustain a long winning streak. The closest they came to a long winning streak was late in the season when at one point they won five out of six games. The season was not without its highlights. This marked the first season that Cambridge held its own Varsity Boy's basketball tournament.

The four team (Cambridge, Alwood, Erie, and Riverdale) tournament had a round-robin format so every team played each

other. During the tournament, the team provided some excitement. They defeated Alwood for Coach Wise's 100th career coaching victory. That win also sent the Vikings into the championship game against Riverdale. The team played extremely well against the Rams who were ranked in the state at the time, and forced the game into overtime. The Rams were just too much to handle in the overtime, and the Vikes had to settle for second place. The biggest disappointment for the team came in the last two weeks of the season. They had a chance to finish third in the conference but lost three of their last four games and finished fifth. Brian Cardona was honored by being named first team All-Conference.

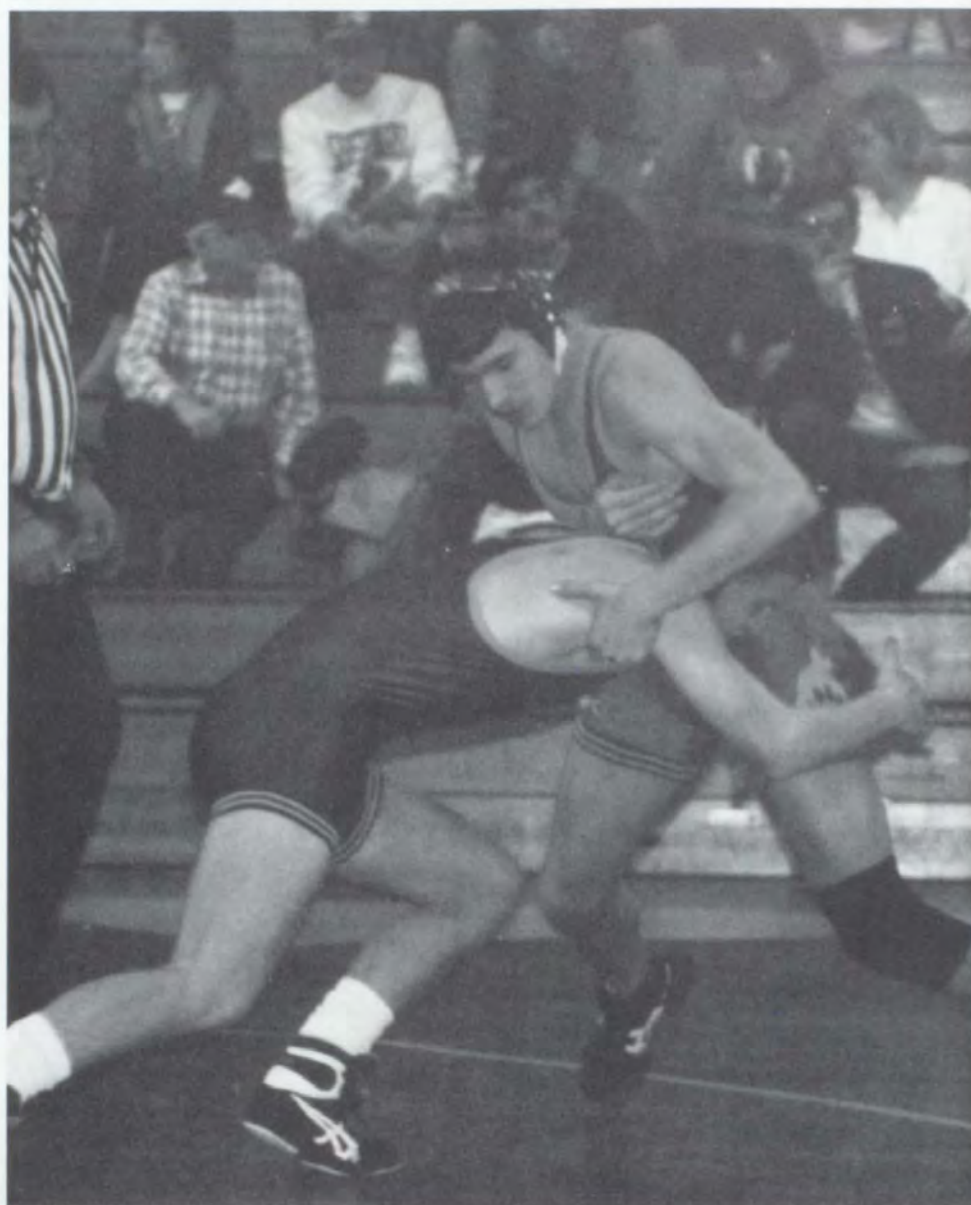

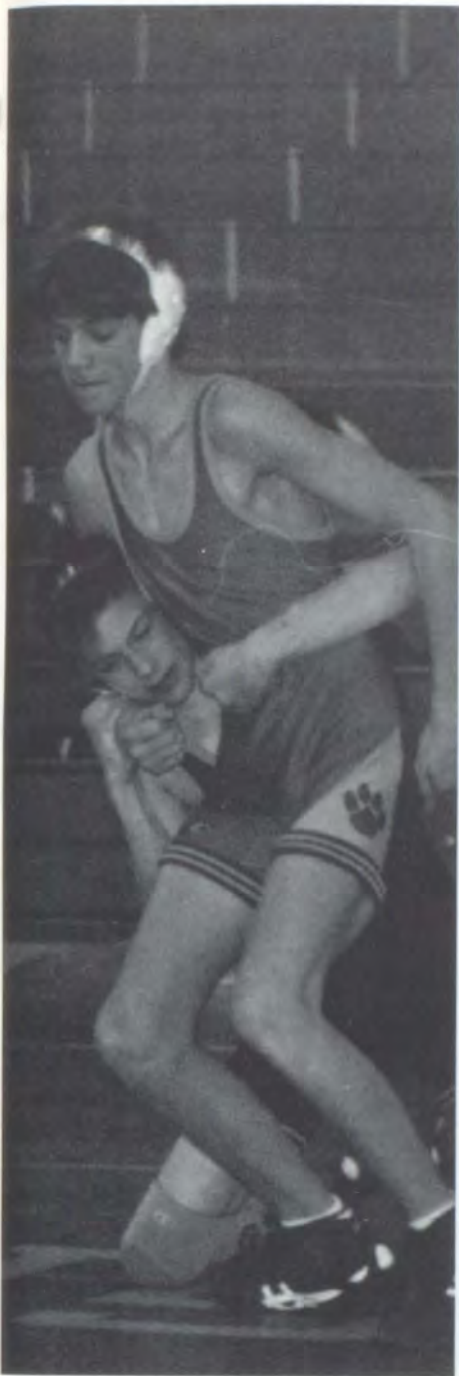

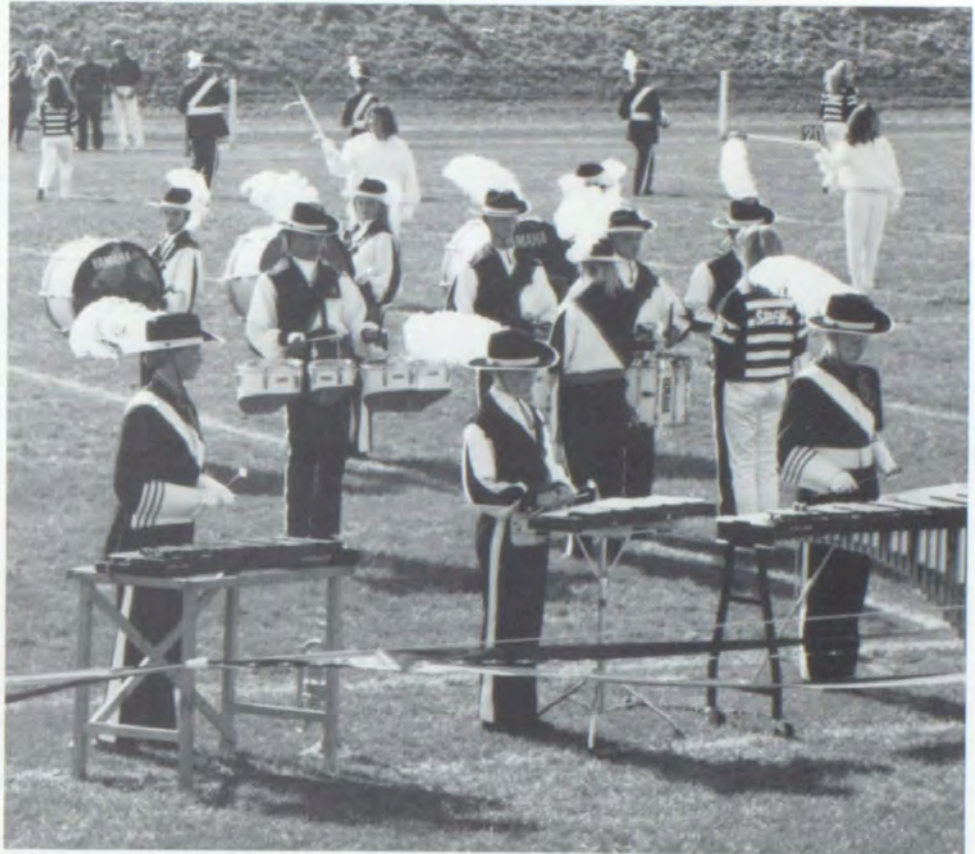

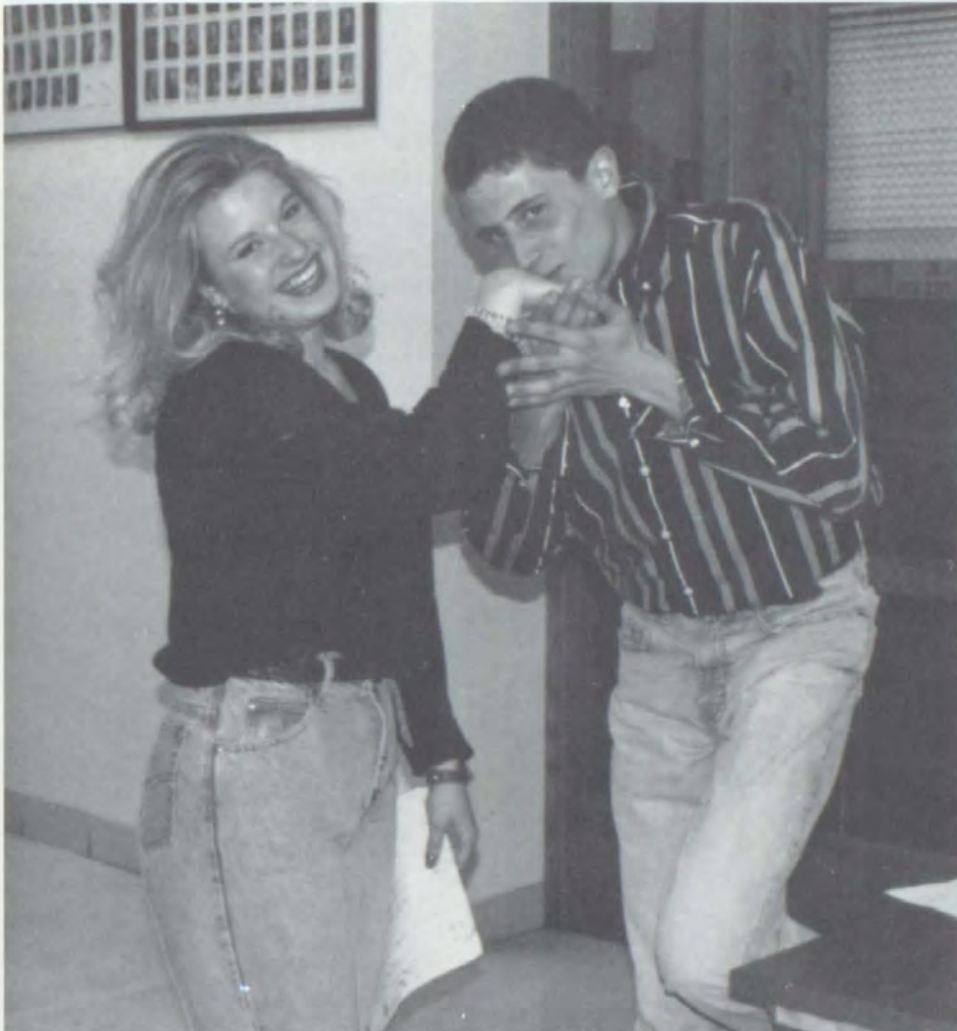

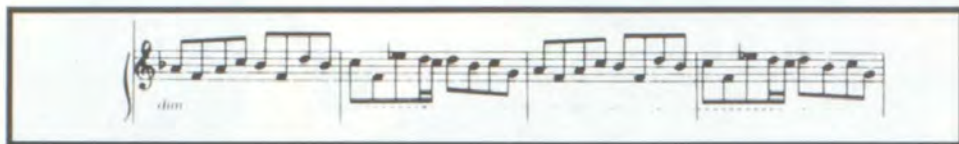

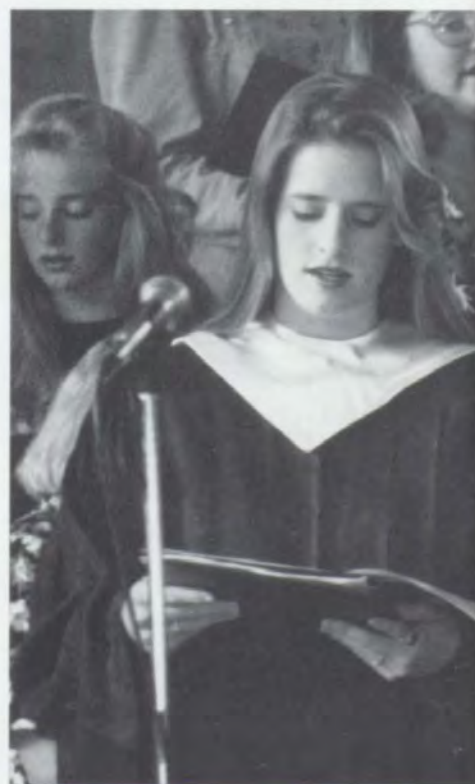
